## Position statement on:

## Conservation Translocations

CapeNature aims to ensure that the conservation translocation of wild animals contributes to the greatest conservation benefit.

CapeNature considers conservation translocation as the intentional movement and release of a living organism(s) where the primary objective is a conservation benefit.

CapeNature considers that unregulated or injudicious conservation translocations of wild animals may pose a significant threat to biodiversity.

CapeNature recognises that conservation translocation involves the intentional movement and release of an organism both inside and outside its indigenous range.

CapeNature recognises that all conservation translocations must have a primary and overriding conservation benefit.

CapeNature recognises that any conservation benefit of any conservation translocation must clearly outweigh the risks and costs posed.

CapeNature requires that any conservation translocation must be driven and supported by a risk assessment.

CapeNature requires that the original cause / reason, for which the conservation translocation is ultimately required (i.e. extinction / extirpation), must be correctly identified and removed or sufficiently reduced prior to any translocation.
